First Aid/CPR Training

In an effort to ensure an even greater level of safety/security for our students, all members of our Faculty and Staff gave up an entire Saturday in March to be properly trained and certified in First Aid and CPR. We have also updated all First Aid boxes throughout the School and have identified other relevant areas for First Aid boxes to be placed. To round out our efforts in this area, we will also be providing AED (Automated External Defibrillator) training. An AED is a sophisticated, reliable, safe, computerized device that delivers electric shocks to a casualty in cardiac arrest.

Faith Food for Thought "Be Happy" by Sister Judith Marie Rollo

In Matthew's Gospel, chapters 5 - 7, Jesus states unequivocally what it means to be his disciple. These chapters comprise the Sermon on the Mount. It is like presenting his party platform.... "If you are my followers, my disciples, this is how you are to live". The foundation of this teaching is found in the Beatitudes. Jesus presents to us a way of life deeper and more demanding than keeping the commandments of the Old Testament. These beatitudes are very simply stated but profound in meaning. They constitute a map to follow to help us along in our journey to be with God. They tell us what it is that Christ really cares about: the poor, the meek, the sorrowful, the merciful, the pure of heart, the peacemakers, those who seek justice and those who suffer persecution. The beatitudes are promises of happiness; but how contradictory they are to the standards of

our world.

We cannot help notice the apparent contradictions bound up in Our Lord's puzzling promises: The poor are rich... those who mourn are blessed: the meek will be powerful; the hungry shall be filled; the persecuted are blessed

What does our world suggest? We are urged to pretend to be rich or powerful. Our world wants us to play along when it assures us that we're loved without limit or qualifications when we really are not. The smiling faces on TV seem sincerely solicitous as to whether or not we are able to clean greasy pots, polish our kitchen floors to a brilliant shine or banish all the germs from our bathrooms. Let us not be fooled. Remember that advertising agencies hire people to sell that particular pot scrubber or

Did you know?

Doctor William Masters was the first boy to enter the High School Division of Mount Saint Agnes. In an interview with Doctor Masters in "Doctors' Tales" by Robin Muir Lang, he shared some interesting comments about MSA. When asked about his early education, Doctor Masters stated that he attended MSA because his mother did. She was the third graduate of the Academy. About his early memories of the School, he replied: "Well, we were taught by nuns at Mount Saint Agnes. They were all nuns at that time and I passed quickly right through the School. I did very well there." When asked if he were caned by the nuns, he replied: "No, no. Well, I never got a caning. One thing that the nuns concentrated on was good behavior and you were given marks for good behavior. And politeness. (sic) For instance if you met a lady, you let the lady pass through first and all that sort of thing. Those were the kinds of things that were taught at Mount Saint Agnes."
