MSA in the News

Learning Locally, Excelling Globally

Walking into the grade one classroom at Mount Saint Agnes Academy (MSA) feels a bit like stumbling into a budding startup company. Colorful pictures don the walls, while students gather excitedly around the SMART Board, as one of their peers manipulates colorful shapes to create a pattern. With her right index finger, she slides the blue triangle next to the green circle, completing the ten-item row. Applause resounds from the onlookers and the room feels more like a brainstorming meeting in which the idea for Facebook was created, than the chalkboard lectures of yesteryear.

And that is because the learning does focus on a collaborative approach, one in which the students are encouraged, through inquiry, to problem solve. It is a style in which the way the child thinks is just as important, if not more, as the content he or she is taught.

Using the Alberta Curriculum, one of the World's leading internationally recognized

systems of learning, MSA's student-centered approach ensures a global education in which students develop to the best of their abilities. The curriculum truly is global with accredited international schools in China, Hong Kong, Qatar, United Arab Emirates, and Mexico.

More impressive, however, than the countries in which the curriculum is now taught are the student results: in the test results of the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA), which is administered by the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), Alberta placed top in reading, science and math out of 65 countries.

MSA's curriculum is based on the philosophy that students must be problem solvers, community citizens and global thinkers. While it has always remained dedicated to offering a "faith-based, values-added education," MSA serves to deliver on its new curriculum's philosophy through smaller class sizes from Kindergarten to Grade 12.

The intellectual, social, and emotional development that MSA's students receive is consistent from Elementary to High School. In fact, it is the only school on the island to offer a continuous curriculum, which culminates in its graduates receiving the Alberta High School Diploma. In its first year of accreditation, 97 percent of the 2013 class successfully completed it.

Mount Saint Agnes Academy has been committed to developing the whole child for 124 years since the Sisters of Charity arrived on the island in 1890. While it has maintained its strong Christian identity through faith and learning, MSA has adapted to serve students for the demands they will face in today and tomorrow's society. As an Alberta Accredited International School, MSA is allowing students to learn locally and excel globally.

Fortunately, many hands make light work. And while superheroes were present at MSA's "Comic Life" Bazaar, it took the concerted effort of a community of students, parents, faculty, staff, alumni and friends to ensure that this event continued its legacy as the oldest, continuous fair on the Island still in existence.



The Fair, as it was originally known, started with the inception of Mount Saint Agnes Academy in 1890. It was more of an arts and crafts fair by the Sisters of Charity than the cotton-candy-servingfun-filled-raffle-drawing fundraiser of today.

In fact, it has evolved to become the largest fundraiser for MSA. This year it netted more than \$100,000 in raffle sales before the Bishop formally blessed and announced the opening of the Bazaar on October 18th. These funds will be used to assist the school in its mission to provide the highest quality education in a caring, Christian environment.

While the economy has been slow and people are willing to forego more elastic goods such as raffle tickets, they were an easier sell when people saw the prizes, which ranged from a Kia Rio Hatchback (leather seats, anyone?), to a family trip to Universal Studios, to ten \$1,000 grocery vouchers. The risk was certainly worth the reward. Just ask the winners!

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How quickly time flies, the first three months of the school year have already been completed. The Bazaar has been concluded and we are fortunate to have it be another success. Thank you to all who participated or contributed in any way. A lot of work and organizing is done by a few for the benefit of all. For those of you who were involved, your efforts have not gone unnoticed. Also, a great well done to the students, whose pre-sale of raffle tickets far exceeded last year's sales. The importance of the event from the perspective of community, fund raising and stakeholder bonding cannot be overstated.

This summer a number of enhancements were undertaken to improve the infrastructure and the education process. The main one was the locker room renovation project, which commenced on the last day of school in June, and was completed just before school started in September. The old facility, which was original from the opening of the school in 1967, was in dire need of upgrading. It also provided security and supervising issues, since the bath and changing rooms were one floor above and away from the gymnasium where the PE teachers were with classes. New girls and boys changing rooms, including showers and bathrooms, have been constructed downstairs in the new section that was added onto the gymnasium. The old facilities upstairs have been converted into a new Guidance Counselor's office, a meeting room and a large multi-use room. In addition, two new bathrooms were constructed across from the balcony of the auditorium. This project was funded by monies raised from our successful Capital Campaign, Investing Together for Tomorrow, which had a goal of \$5,000,000, received pledges of \$5,281,698 and collected cash to date of \$5,125,448.

Some of the smaller projects completed were the construction of a ramp for wheelchair access to the auditorium, the installation of new bleachers in the gymnasium, and the installation of a new clock and bell system throughout the school.

Two Board members stepped off the Board at the end of the last school year; Steven Antonition after six years and Susan Patschak after four years. During his tenure Steven served in the Technology, Bursaries, and Academic committees and was Chair of the last two committees for five years. Susan served on the Academic committee, chaired the Enrollment committee in its inaugural year and was Deputy Chair of the Board. They were dedicated to the mission of MSA and worked tirelessly in progressing its objectives and goals. They graciously and voluntarily gave up their time, energy and skills for the school and the MSA family. On behalf of the Board, and the entire MSA community, I extend gratitude, thanks and appreciation for all of their support, contribution and commitment made during their terms.

It is with great pleasure that I announce the four new appointed Board members: William DeSilva Jr. and Janice Gutteridge, both Bishop's appointees, and Greg Rymon-Lipinski and Joe Amaral, both Home & School Association appointees. Willie, who is a graduate of MSA, class of '79, finished three two-year terms in August 2010, and hence has been off the Board for three years. During his initial tenure he served in many leadership positions and, because of this experience, is now the Deputy Chair of the Board and Chair of the Enrollment committee. Willie is a Fellow Certified Management Accountant and holds a **Business Administration degree from** Saint Francis Xavier University. He has extensive business experience and is President and CEO of Even Par Limited. Janice Gutteridge, who attended MSA from K – 10, completing her secondary education at boarding school, is a lawyer, an associate in the Corporate Department of Cox Hallet Wilkinson Limited. Her legal experience, as well as her knowledge and experience with

Trusts, will be an asset. She has a Bachelor of Law (Honours) degree from the University of Essex. Greg Rymon-Lipinski is a Chartered Accountant with a Bachelor of Commerce degree with Honors (First Class) from the University of the Witwatersrand in South Africa. He has been in Bermuda since 2001 and has 16 years of accounting and auditing experience, as well as significant financial services experience, with specific focus on the (re)insurance industry.
