

In our current unit in Science 8, we have been exploring fresh and saltwater systems. We have investigated how water quality influences living things, and water affects landforms and climate.

One focus is about discovering how human activities and needs have changed our planet's water supplies and the environments that depend on them. This year we had an opportunity to take advantage of a two-day field trip offered by the Bermuda Aquarium Museum & Zoo (BAMZ) called Kids on the Reef. During this field trip students had classroom sessions in the morning about freediving, fish identification, coral reefs and ocean conservation as well as stretches and breathing exercises to prepare the mind and the body. Then they spent the afternoon in the water around Trunk Island to get comfortable and acquainted with the underwater world and their gear. On the second day, they used their new-

ly-learned skills to attempt a free dive of approximately 20 ft 8 miles off the shores of Bermuda. Students got to swim around a shipwreck and explore a beautiful reef. Field trips are a great way for our students to learn the information and hands-on experience enhances what they learn in the classroom.

Prayer Service in Honor of St. Francis of Assisi by Annette Boyle

On October 4th, students from kindergarten to grade five attended a prayer service in honor of St. Francis of Assisi. Father Joseph Morley was the officiating priest. There were also special guests at this service - two dogs named Sparkie (owned by Gabbie Barbosa) and Murphy (owned by Mrs. Moench). During the service Father Joe blessed both Sparkie and Murphy and the students' photos of their pets. These photos are displayed on a bulletin board outside the office. Mary Rose Mathias read the introduction to the prayer service. Savannah Martin read the life of St. Francis. Boris Dombre read the Old Testament selection. During the reading of the Old Testament selection Hunter De Madeiros, Khloe Munt, and Jason Dixon-DaSilva lit candles to honor those animals that live on land, in the sea and in the air. A special candle was lit by Mrs. Boyle in memory of her dog Rambo and all other pets who have gone to heaven. The Prayers of the Faithful were read by Alexia



Medeiros and Carter Lamb. At the end of the service Dr. Madeiros from Ettrick Animal Hospital and Kate Martin from the SPCA spoke to the students about their work.

Saint Francis of Assisi was born in the small town of Assisi, Italy, in the year 1182. Assisi is a town ninety miles north of Rome. Like many early saints, he lived a very simple life of poverty, and in so doing, he gained a reputation of being the friend of animals. Saint Francis is often pictured amidst birds and animals in a time when animals were treated very cruelly. He understood that respect began with the lowliest of all God's creatures. The genuine holiness of Saint Francis was shown in the respect and great love he had for all these creatures created by God. Saint Francis is considered to be the first advocate for animals, a man before his time, about 700 years to be precise. He established the rule of St Francis, which exists today as the Order of St. Francis or the Franciscans. St. Francis died in 1226 at the age of 44.

We hope that this service encouraged the students to follow in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi and inspired them to imitate his joyful love of God and all His Creation. A big thank you to all those who participated in this annual prayer service at MSA especially Mrs. Boyle, who has coordinated this prayer service since 2007.

The second phase of the project included the entire MSA student body. On Thursday, November 14th, MSA held a food drive to donate non-perishable good to the TEDS Food Bank. Students displayed great generosity by filling 10 large bins of goods.
